Szopki Krakowskie

The Kraków Nativity Crèches

Here in America most everyone is familiar with the Nativity Scenes or Crèche that make their appearance during the Season of Advent. Being the youngest child, it was my responsibility to set up the manger scene; each year I would spend an entire morning placing all the figures in just the right spot, often moving them around until I had them just perfect. Of course, the baby Jesus would not make his appearance until after Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve when he was placed in the crib for the Magi to honor, and in my mind, gave meaning to the exacting placement of the figures (although I think most of this effort was lost on my two sisters).

The tradition of the Nativity Crèche goes back to St. Francis of Assisi in the 13th century and spread quickly throughout Europe, including of course, Poland. In Poland the tradition took on a life of its own. A Nativity scene play, the Jasełka became popular with performers making their way through towns and villages reenacting the birth of Christ. Soon szopki (manger scenes) were created and used in the Jasełka; they became ever more elaborate and secular until they were banned from churches, but continued on in the village squares and markets.

In Kraków local craftsmen began to create beautiful ornate szopki for Advent to showcase their talent and earn a little extra income during this idle time of the year. The szopki were popular and



became collectible; the magnate Potocki family became early patrons of the tradition. But Kraków being Kraków, the Nativity scene changed from the stable in Bethlehem to notable historical buildings in the city, such as the Sukiennice, St. Mary's Church, Wawel, etc. All are characterized by their ornate, richly decorated and colorful stylistic presentation. But traditionally, the Bethlehem stable is still to be found on the ground floor of the building portrayed.

Each year, on the first Thursday of December, in the Main Market Square next to the Adam Mickiewicz Monument

It was not an ordinary party; no less a typical Polish bash. African drummers kicked off the evening with improvised rhythms of African drumbeat accompanied by ATB Germany's "Destination Unknown" in the background.

Partygoers reveled in Polish food and paraded in breathtaking costumes, rang-

Poland's National Song and Dance Ensemble, Mazowsze, performed at O'Shaughnessy Auditorium on the campus of the College of St. Catherine Monday evening, November 19th. As promised "they whirled, leapt and performed in a glorious out-pouring of sound and motion, rhythm and music to celebrate the cultural legacy of Poland. An ensemble of 90 dancers and singers performed in a seemingly unending display of hand-made traditional costumes making it a dramatic and colorful spectacle."

The dancers were stunning in their energy, acrobatics and singing. It was as if someone put the Cirque du Soleil and Riverdance together into one program, ranging from majestic pageantry to the lighthearted flirting of the young.

Jerzy Hornik, PACIM Board Director, MIC Program Director and *Pol-Am* writer introduced Mazowsze to the over 1200 who came to see Mazowsze: "Tonight's performance is brought to you by three magnificent organizations. Born July 28, 1961, in Little Rock, married and has two children and makes his home in Palo Alto, CA and Evergreen, CO. Selected as an astronaut in March 1992 and is a veteran of five space flights: 1994, 1997, 1998,

2001 and 2007. Dr. Parazynski made a daring spacewalk and repaired a damaged solar array on the International Space Station on Nov 3, 2007. Dr. Parazynski, by coincidence, was one of the best astronauts for the unusual spacewalk. He has spent more time in spacewalks than all but four others in the history of the NASA space program.
