PACIM's Polish Children's Fund and Wigilia Benefit

For many years now the Polish American Cultural Institute of Minnesota has been doing what we can to better the lives of

Częstochowa, Kraśnik and the school for blind children in Laski.

Each summer one or more of our board



disadvantaged children in Poland. With Chester Rog we boxed up used clothing, toys and toiletries and asked for monetary donations to cover the shipping costs to Poland for these items. Two years ago we shifted our focus from sending care packages to presenting monetary donations to the institutions that care for these children. In this way, 100% of the money we raise for the "Polish Children's Fund" goes directly to the needs of the children. In this manner we have since given over \$2,000 to orphanages in Toruń,

directors investigate institutions with pressing needs and assess whether our donation will directly benefit the children. The board then authorizes disbursements from the fund in the form of a donation directly into the hands of the administrator thereby establishing a personal link between the institution and PACIM.

Ruling Party of Poland Defeated in Sunday Election

Donald Tusk, leader of the pro-business Civic Platform party has ousted prime minister Jaroslaw Kaczyński's conservatives in parliamentary elections, early results said.

It is the strongest showing for any single party since the eastern European country overthrew Communism in 1989.

Voters across the nation of 38 million turned out in record numbers to deal a bruising verdict on Kaczyński's two-year crusade to belatedly purge former Communists and fight for the country's interests in the EU with combative methods that have left the nation marginalised in Europe.

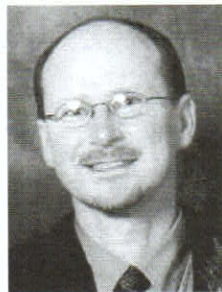

PACIM Annual Meeting

The Polish American Cultural Institute of Minnesota held its annual meeting on October 7th. President Steven Ukasick briefly outlined the past years activities which included: the Wigilia Orphan Benefit Dinner, Soup Fest, Beginning Polish Language Instruction, Bal Karnawałowy, 2007 Urban Expedition: Poland! at the Landmark Center, TPT Pledge Drive, PACIM bus trip to Polish Chicago, Festival of Nations Café, Volunteer Appreciation Picnic. This year, we will be adding a Bus trip to Chicago's Christkindl Market.

PACIM membership has reached 360 full members, which reflects a doubling of membership over the past two years. Another exciting development is that fully 1/3 of the PACIM board is under the age 35 and includes a great range of talent, skills and business contacts. This all provides great promise and hope for the future of the organization. Many Polonia groups in the nation cannot say the same. Our finances remain very strong. There was some worry that the rent on our space would cut into our reserves; but the opposite has been the case. Children's Fund continues

Toruń, visited one of the few hospices in Poland serving children stricken with cancer. The hospice movement is in the



embryonic stage in Poland and lacks the development seen in this country. Poland lacks the resources we take for granted. But the hospice they visited in Toruń, Hospicjum dla Dzieci "Nadzieja," was a shining example of what sheer determination can accomplish. Two elderly grandparents have persisted over the last six to eight years to establish a remarkable facility for terminally ill children in Toruń and the surrounding region. They were impressed by the warmth and loving care shown the critically ill young patients.

However, what is lacking is the more sophisticated equipment for diagnosis, medications and simple things such as vans for transporting patients and their families. Money for these items is hard to come by in Poland and they were asked to help; they promised to do what they could.

How can you help? Each December we sponsor our Wigilia Benefit for Polish Children in which \$5 of each ticket goes the Fund. This year the benefit will be on December 16th. 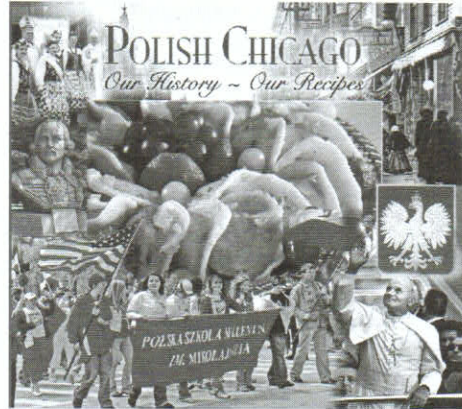

Polish Chicago, Our History~Our Recipes

G. Bradley Publishing sent the PACIM Library Polish Chicago, "Our History~Our Recipes" by Joseph W.



Zurawski for us to review. This is the most fantastic book of the history of Chicago's Polish organizations, businesses, and traditions with recipes from families and popular restaurants. People who have traveled on the bus with us to Polish Chicago will no doubt recognize the names of the restaurants and the special foods we ate there. Those wanting to experience the Polish culture of Chicago will want to use this book as a guide.

Very little of Chicago's Polish culture is included in the popular guidebooks and trip planners. Incredibly, we are told again and again by the Chicago Tourist Bureau that there are no Polish restaurants, stores, or churches in the city. This book is so beautiful; it pains me to have to return it to the library. The \$37.50 price may put some potential buyers out of the picture. But, it is worth every cent!

So grab a map, guidebook, and a fistful of złoty and go explore Poland.



Proszę and Dziękuję go a long way when accompanied with a smile; you need not be fluent in Polish to enjoy the country. —Irene



The travel book Poland published by Lonely Planet is one of the best books in my opinion. Read it; all of it. Then create your own tour. —Irene



Warsaw is as exciting as Kraków; there's an undercurrent of energy surging through the streets so get out and walk, walk and walk some more. Then seat yourself at a sidewalk café and watch the life of the city pass by with all its pageantry. —Irene

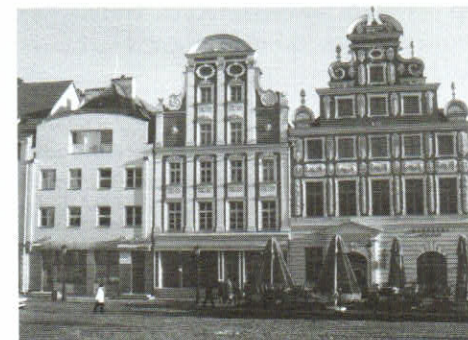
Don't be afraid to stop in the little shops along the way and chat with the shop keepers; you didn't travel to Europe to shop at Walmart! —Irene



Watch out for luggage weight limits! Commuter planes within Poland restrict you to just 34 lbs. —Judith



If you don't want to drive or take public transportation hire your own driver. Most hotels know of people who will provide this service. Expect to pay a minimum of \$100 a day, plus gas and meals. If an overnight stay is involved, the driver's room must be paid for as well. Make sure the payment details are worked out before you set out. —Judith





Be prepared to be met with instances of extreme kindness by those you encounter and don't forget to leave a tip. —*Judith*



Poles keep saying, "To jest nie daleko" and "Jest blisko." "it's not far" and "it's near" Well, I know now what "blisko" means to Poles; be prepared for a good walk! —*Judith*



The best time to go is late September and early October. This time is called the golden autumn which I think refers to the wonderful weather. The weather is around 70 degrees and sunny during the day and cool at night. Otherwise, the weather in Poland is much as it is here. Many places don't have air conditioning and the heat is not turned on until October 15 (no matter what). —*Judith*



The advantages of traveling independently in Poland is that you can go where you wish, when you want and at your own pace. In addition, you have much more opportunity to interact with the "person on the street." Your hotel is a great source of help....use them. — *Phyllis*



The highlight of many a trip is meeting the distant cousins. Be prepared for traditional Polish hospitality including an elaborate meal followed by shots of vodka "for the stomach." If you want to be treated like royals visit your distant relatives in the villages of Poland! —*Judith*



The advantages of traveling with an organized tour are that all the logistical arrangements are already made for you. You will see a lot, but not in depth. It's a pretty hassle free way to travel, since meals, accommodations, guides and translation is all taken care of. — *Phyllis*



A lot of tourists don't go to Lublin. It's a shame because they miss so much. The castle has a wonderful museum of ethnic clothing and arts. Attached to it is a chapel built by King Jagiello with the only known remaining picture of him. Along a band running about five feet from the floor are a group of signatures which look like graffiti. The guide explained to us that they were the signatures of all of the people who signed the Polish/Lithuanian treaty. —*Judith*

We also now have the Oscar-nominated "Young Girls of Wilko" by Wajda and a donation of "The Girls" from Nowolipki. Also, we added "Polish American Studies" vol LXIII num 2 which contains John Radziłowski's article on Poles in St. Paul. 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Św. Szymon z Lipnicy
(c.1435-1482)
St Simon of Lipnica

On June 3rd, 2007 His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI canonized Szymon making him one of over thirty Polish saints. Simon was born in Lipnica Murowana. The preaching of the Franciscan, St. John of Capistrano inspired Simon and he was ordained a Franciscan

priest in 1460. In 1463 he became the preacher at the Wawel Cathedral in Kraków. When the plague came to Kraków Fr. Simon comforted the sick and dying until he himself was infected. On July 18, 1482 he died and he humbly requested to be buried under the threshold of the church so that all could trample him.
