## Walt Dziedzic to be Honored

This year, at our Bal Karnawałowy, the Polish American Cultural Institute of Minnesota is recognizing Walt Dziedzic for 50 years of exemplary public service to the citizens of Minneapolis and the nation. Walt represents the best the Polish American community of Northeast Minneapolis has to offer.

After graduation from Edison High School in Minneapolis and a semester at the University of Minnesota, Walt played ball in 1951 for the Brooklyn Dodgers; but his professional baseball career was cut short by the Korean War. Upon completing his military service, he finished his education at the College of St. Thomas and became a teacher at De La Salle High School for one year. He then joined the Minneapolis Police Department where he rose through the ranks over the course of the next 16 years.

In 1976 he was elected as a Minneapolis alderman from Northeast Minneapolis, a position he used to combat the institutionalized prejudice against Northeast as an area of industry and immigrants with a bar on each corner. He spearheaded the Quarry Development as a way to bring competitive grocery prices to Northeast and it ended up as the area's premier shopping center. He was also instrumental in bringing to life "Art-A-Whirl," a celebration of artists and their art in Northeast.

After 20 years as First Ward City Council Member, in 1997 Walt ran for a seat on the Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board to further his commitment to children and recreation. He held the position of Park Commissioner until his retirement in 2009.

His years in public service have been marked by his dedication to the community and its people. As a public servant he was dedicated to the cause of racial equality and helped get African Americans elected to public office. There are many people in Minneapolis who do not know who Walter Dziedzic is, but they all benefit from the many projects and programs that he has supported over his 50 years of service. All who know him are unanimous that Walt has never forgotten his roots in Northeast, its people and above all its children. ## **News From Poland**

According to Finance Minister, Jacek Rostowski, Poland could adopt the euro as its currency in 2015.

Around 15,400 more Poles **emigrated** last year than returned to their country, according to a report by the EU's statistics office.

Poland will spend 12 billion złotys (\$4.3 billion) in 2010 on supporting the **unemployed**.

Germany will pay 60 million euros (\$86 million) to help preserve the museum at **Auschwitz**, the former German Nazi concentration camp in southern Poland.

Increasing numbers of Poles (83%) believe that Poland should provide **development assistance to less developed countries** according to results from a survey carried for the Foreign Ministry.

The governing party will submit a bill to make January 6, the Christian holiday of **Epiphany**, a holiday in Poland.

Approximately 110,000 homes were left without electricity and a great number of trains were delayed after very heavy **snow-fall** in Poland in early January.

Imperial Brands, Inc., a subsidiary of Belvedere S.A., announced a multi-year partnership agreement with actor and producer Bruce Willis to promote **Sobieski Vodka** in North America.

Jacek Borcuch's new film "All That I Love" is the first Polish film ever to be admitted to the competition at **Sundance Film Festival**, the largest independent film festival in the US.



# Heritage Homecoming

Poland welcomes back Suwalska geese, Green Leg hens, Polish Red cattle and other local breeds as farmers struggle to adapt to modern times and the challenges that come with membership in the European Union.

"The only problem with Heifer's poultry program is that it didn't start soon enough," says Barbara Mikielska, joking as we stand admiring the healthy flocks of chickens and geese ranging around her farmyard. Farms of modest dimensions like hers are typical in this northeastern region of Poland, where rocky, postglacial soils and long, punishing winters make for thin vegetation. But these birds didn't seem to care and kept busy scratching up bits of goodness from around our feet.

She and her husband, Andrzej, farm about 50 acres here and harbor simple

yet universal desires—a reliable roof overhead and a solid education for their children so they can someday get good jobs in this small agricultural community. But they are making do with a leaky thatched roof and the strong likelihood that the children will leave to find work in a big city. Yet the quality of life here is great—Barbara Mikielska loves the deep and generous silence of the place—and with the help of Heifer Poland the couple are working to build prosperity at home and in the community.

Hope and hard work are needed. Poland is one of the most agricultural countries in Europe—22 percent of Poles are engaged daily on the farm, according to a recent story in *The New York Times*.

And many are still struggling to adapt to changes after the country's entry into the European Union in 2004. They are a very resilient and adaptable people, having survived numerous invasions, collectivization under the Soviets and bumpy market reforms post-Solidarity. These upheavals, though, sapped much of Polish agriculture's traditional independence as farmers abandoned locally developed breeds of animals in favor of modern varieties.

Animals bred for large-scale modern agriculture don't thrive on the small farms that predominate in Poland, especially in the Mikielskas' region. Breeds like the black-and-white Holstein dairy cow require excellent forage, supplemental grains with vitamins and minerals, and

periodic visits from a veterinarian—all of which small farmers can little afford.

So the Mikielskas and scores of other farmers in this area, mere miles from both Lithuania and Russia, decided to go the other direction by welcoming historic breeds of animals back onto their farms. These breeds include the Green Leg hen and Suwalska goose that were developed here and thrived for generations without the aid of modern agricultural methods.



In so doing, these farmers build a bridge from the past to a more sustainable and prosperous future.

#### Old Favorites

In Warsaw, I piled my camera gear into a truck piloted by one of Heifer Poland's able field assistants, Piotr Jasnewicz, and we drove north to meet some of these animals. My mission was to create portraits of the animals with their new owners on black-and-white film to illustrate their long and recently renewed relationship.

As we traveled north, dodging convoys of freight trucks streaming to and from the Russian border, Jasnewicz educated me about how Heifer International works to find, redevelop and distribute the animals to farmers in all corners of the country. By raising these animals, the farmers help Heifer restore their dangerously low populations, in part by passing on the gift.

Polish Red cattle, for example, have been husbanded in Poland since the Middle Ages, and once constituted 25 percent of the national herd. As recently as a decade ago, though, there were only 150 left in the country.



Polish Reds, with their compact bodies and stout legs, are well adapted to the climate and rocky, uneven terrain here. And because they're smaller than improved breeds, their feed requirements are much lower. They are prolific producers of milk that is higher in fat, protein and enzymes—perfect for cheese making. They are long-lived, dual-purpose (they can be raised for both beef and milk), highly fertile, good-natured, robust and resistant to disease. Also highly independent, Polish Red cows often birth their calves without assistance, unlike Holsteins, which require more vigilance on the part of their owners. Heifer also works to preserve and improve White Backed and Simmental cattle breeds, which offer similar advantages.



Other characters in Heifer Poland's animal menagerie include the Złotnicki Białe pig, which is disease-resistant, and the Konik Polski (Polish pony), an ancient breed descended from the Tarpan horse that exhibits wild traits such as stripes on its legs and back. These intelligent, docile and willing workhorses are

perfect for small-scale, sustainable agriculture. The Suwalska goose, derived from a primitive species found in the northern part of the country, provides wonderful eggs but is better known for its easy growth and solid musculature.

The other true workhorse in Heifer Poland's stable is the Green Leg hen. Also called the Polish partridge, it is revered for the high quality of its meat, but more so for its eggs, which some people say are low in the bad sort of cholesterol and high in the good kind. Proponents of the



breed claim people who are allergic to chicken eggs in general, especially children, are able to eat these eggs.

These special qualities help Green Leg eggs command excellent prices. Green Legs hens live up to 10 years and will lay eggs nearly that whole time.

News from Little Falls. Minnesota

With no news to speak of, I want to share a bit about my grandparents. Both my maternal grandparents were born in Silesia. My grandfather came to America in 1885 at the age of 25. Only he came here: the rest of his family went to Brazil. He met and married my grandmother in Morrison County where they farmed and raised their family. They retired from farming and moved to Bowlus. My grandmother could not speak English but my grandfather did quite well.

In Bowlus, they began a small business making willow baskets of all shapes and sizes. They would gather the willows in spring, peel the willows and soak them in hot water to make them pliable and easy to work with. People came from great distances to purchase their baskets. The most popular were the clothes baskets of all shapes and sizes. I still have a small clothes basket (made for my doll's clothes) which will be given to my youngest granddaughter.

Another memory is the large beautiful fine wool shawls that many of the Polish ladies owned. Of course they always smelled like moth balls; but they was beautiful and of course aired out before use.


