Conducting Business in Poland for the Foreigner

Interfacing:

Greetings are generally reserved yet courteous. Shake hands firmly with other men. Do not extend your hand to greet a woman. Wait for your female counterpart to extend her invitation to shake hands. Shake hands with everyone upon arriving and leaving. Note: some older businessmen may kiss a woman’s hand upon meeting. Do not imitate this behavior as it may be seen as ‘mocking.’

When greeting someone, direct eye contact, a smile and the appropriate greeting for that time of day will be in order. Note: use direct eye contact with men when greeting; however, do not be surprised if women, at first do not look straight in your eyes.

Generally speaking, Poles judge others by their personal qualities. Therefore they like to spend time getting to know people as individuals. This allows them to size people up. Honesty is highly valued in Poland since trust is the cornerstone of business relationships. Building personal relationships is essential for successful business dealings, especially if you are looking for a long-term business relationship.

Poles are known for being non-direct communicators. They are also very sensitive to other’s feelings and let that

News From Poland

More than 140,000 Poles crowded the Piłsudskiego Square in Warsaw on June 6 for the beatification of **Fr. Jerzy Popieluszko**, a popular priest tortured and killed in 1984 by communist Poland's secret police for supporting Solidarity freedom movement. The feast day commemorating the life of Popieluszko will be held on October 19, the anniversary of his death.

The Interior Ministry released the 40-page transcript of cockpit conversations during the last minutes before the April 10 plane crash that killed **Polish President Lech Kaczyński**. The content of the recording does not answer a question what caused the crash, however it strongly suggests a human error of the pilots, who seem to be fully aware of the poor weather conditions and navigational shortcomings of the airport in Smoleńsk.

The Polish Parliament appointed a former leftist prime minister and until recently a director of IMF's European Department, **Marek Belka**, as the president of Poland's central bank (NBP).

The Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development predicts Poland's **GDP growth** will reach 3.1% in 2010 and 3.9% in 2011 and **inflation** 2.7% and 2.8% respectively. The number of companies filing **bankruptcy** in the first quarter of 2010 was 38% higher than in the same period the year prior. The **unemployment rate** dropped below 12% in May and will drop below 11% in July, while at end-year it should not exceed 12%.

Bronisław Komorowski Wins Polish Presidential Election

Bronisław Komorowski received 53.01% of votes to Jarosław Kaczyński's 46.99%



in Poland's Presidential runoff election held July 4th. Komorowski is from the ruling Civic Platform party and his election should mean a period of political stability for Poland since both the Prime Minister and President are from the same Party. The President in Poland is the Head of State, has veto power of the Sejm and is Supreme Commander of the Armed Services.

Komorowski was born in 1952 in Oborniki Śląskie in southwest Poland to an aristocratic family and took an active part in resisting the Communist government during the Solidarity era. He was arrested during the Martial Law crackdown that followed

He was elected as Speaker of the Sejm in 2007 and became acting president on April 10, 2010 following the death of President Lech Kaczyński in the Smoleńsk plane crash tragedy. As a result early elections were held for President on June 20th and since no candidate received the necessary 50% threshold a runoff election was held July 4th.

Record Floods in Poland

Two waves of record floods in the second half of May and the first half of June caused wide spread damage in many parts of Poland and killed over 20 people. The Polish government estimates that the flooding caused damages totaling \$4.5 billion. Thousands of homes, hundreds of miles of highways and railroads, bridges and other infrastructure have been devastated by the swollen rivers. Tens thousand of people had to be evacuated, schools and factories closed for weeks. The Vistula reached levels not recorded in the last hundred years and caused the evacuation of some parts of Warsaw and closing bridges in Kraków. An invasion of mosquitos followed the receding water raising fears of an epidemic.

The Polish government created a special fund to help people affected by the floods. The European Union offered financial help from its Solidarity Fund. However, those resources may cover only a fraction of rebuilding costs, lost harvest and livestock, especially in that many flood victims did not have flood or crop insurance. Did God Look the Other Way?

World War II's hell arrived early to eastern Poland. Two weeks after Hitler invaded from the west, Joseph Stalin's troops marched in destroying homes, lives, the past and future of nearly two million Poles. Men, women and children were exiled and deported to slave labor camps in the Soviet Union. Most died from malnutrition, exposure, freezing and disease. Others were worked to death.

These inhabitants of the *Kresy* or eastern borderlands of Poland were forced east to Far Asia, Kazakhstan and Siberia. Some escaped and returned to fight with the Polish forces against Nazi Germany in Italy and western Europe. Others survived the war in the Soviet Union or refugee camps in distant places like Africa, India, Mexico and New Zealand.

To honor these brave Poles, the Kresy-Siberia virtual museum was established. Although not housed in a building, the Kresy-Siberia Virtual Museum (www.kresy-siberia.org/) has all the feel of brick and mortar. There is a reception desk, a museum shop, galleries and special exhibits. And, like any museum, it solicits materials for its collections and hosts live receptions.

Stefan Wisnowski, the Kresy-Siberia Foundation President, and Witold J. Lukaszewski, Museum Program Director, worked hard to put together an "A list" of powerful friends for this effort. Notables like Zbigniew Brzezinski, who served as National Security Advisor under President Jimmy Carter; author and speaker Norman Davies; and the famous biographer of Winston Churchill, Sir Martin Gilbert top the list.

In a painfully ironic turn of events, two of Kresy-Siberia's honorary patrons and supporters were killed on April 10, 2010 in Smoleńsk. The plane crash that killed much of Poland's top leadership also claimed the lives of Ryszard Kaczorowski (Former President of Poland in Exile) and Janusz Krupski (Director of Veterans and Repressed Office).

In August 2009, the virtual museum began hosting a special exhibit. "Polish Children in Exile: Identity and Culture," contains excerpts and drawings from the books and diaries of Polish children deported by the Soviet Union. The curator of the exhibit is Wesley (Wiesław) Adamczyk who may be best known for his autobiographical look at that deportation. His novel, *When God*

Looked the Other Way, tells of his two year enslavement in sub-human conditions and escape to Persia in 1942. Mr. Adamczyk is devoted to telling the stories of the Kresy Poles and to the massacre in Katyn, of which his father was a victim.

Only since 1989 has the truth about this painful period in Polish history become public. As Mr. Lukaszewski says in his outline of the museum, "This large chunk of history was repressed, ignored or simply not told during the Cold War because it would have revealed the Soviet Union's brutality and disregard for human life." He further explains the importance of making the truth known today, "Only through uncensored history can we teach lessons which may help us avoid such horrors in the future."

The Polish government supports Kresy-Siberia's mission. In a clip available on the website, Poland's Minister of Foreign Affairs, Rodasław Sikorski, congratulates the founders of the museum and states how he personally instructed Polish consulates and embassies to gather documents and artifacts relating to this important period in Poland's history. He adds, "I hope this museum becomes an impor-



tant source for knowledge of history for young people worldwide, and becomes a partnership between Poland and its *Diaspora* across the world.

At last check the virtual museum has approximately 1000 members worldwide; however, it is a work in progress. As Stephan Wisnowski says in his introduction to the website, “We need your stories, the stories of your families and neighbors, photographs and documents.” After hundreds of years of invasions and partitions, Poland needs places like Kresy-Siberia to keep her history and culture alive.

Come visit the Kresy-Siberia exhibit at the Twin Cities Polish Festival on August 14 & 15 for more information and to speak with representatives from the group. They are very interested in establishing contact with local families who have had personal experience in this tragic exile.
