Twin Cities Polish Festival

Mark your calendars. The 4th Annual Twin Cities Polish Festival comes to the



banks of the Mississippi River August 11 and 12. The family-oriented event is a glorious celebration of Poland, her culture, arts, music and, of course, food. Bring the whole family—

the Festival has something to offer for everyone from small children to seniors.

Relax under shaded tent areas to watch performances, eat, drink and mingle. Indulge your kids in the expanded Children's Area. Bring your dancing shoes for casual dancing or the Amateur Polka Dance Championships. Plan to spend the better part of two days listening to the best polka bands of the Midwest, sampling authentic Polish food, tracing Polish family roots, and learning about the vibrant Polish culture and activities in the Twin Cities.



Anchoring the North end of the Festival will be the Cultural Stage. Performers directly from

Poland, such as the award winning Akordissimo Quintet, will attract attention, even from the teen-age set. The Quintet, from Koszalin, Poland, are from 15–17 years old. They won First Place at the European Youth Festival in Belgium and were awarded the Grand Prix at the International Accordion Competition in Russia. Their repertoire includes classical, jazz, tango and other contemporary genres.

Adding to the international mix on the Cultural Stage will be Canada's Polonia Polish Folk Dance Ensemble. Dancers, aged 13–37, perform throughout Canada and the upper Midwest. Their reputation



as consummate dancers allowed them to perform for Britain's Prince Charles during his visit to Canada in 2001.

Another big draw to the Cultural Stage will be the Dolina Polish Folk Dance Troupe. Their extensive repertoire includes dances and songs from several regions of Poland, all performed in colorful authentic costumes with lively music and fast-paced choreography. Three age groups comprise the dancers—Adult Dolina dancers, Teen Chabry dancers, and the young Słoneczniki dancers. Count

From Big Band to Elvis, Heavy Metal to Rap, he makes a living out of tapping and drumming. He has performed for former President Gerald Ford, for Mr. Rogers, and for Mikhail Gorbachev in Moscow. Using members of the audience, he creates a full Mountain Band and also does audience sing-a-longs. Don't miss his famous and stunt-like display of playing with flaming spoons.

Using costumes, scripts, music and dance, the workshops give children a taste of theatre performing while helping them learn a beautiful language.

News From Poland

U.S. President Barak Obama awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom (posthumously) to Jan Karski. In 1942, Karski escaped from Nazi occupied Poland to report to the British and U.S. governments on the grave situation in Poland, especially the destruction of the Warsaw Ghetto and the Holocaust of the Jews. During the ceremony, Obama used the term "Polish Death Camp," a slip that caused widespread anger in Poland. He later apologized in a letter to Polish President Bronisław Komorowski for using the term.

President Bronisław Komorowski signed into law a controversial bill increasing the retirement age for Poles to 67, despite massive public opposition to the reform and a string of protests by labor unionists.

Poland's food exports to China in 2012 should surpass the 50% growth rate recorded in 2011 thanks to the opening of the Chinese meat market to 14 Polish companies.

The Polish government is on track to reduce the fiscal deficit to 2.9 % this year.

A new law passed by the lower house of Polish Parliament defines **Polish vodka** as, "an alcoholic beverage produced from grain or potatoes in Poland."

Prosecutors have launched a probe into the sudden death of the founder and first commander of Poland's Special Forces after he was found in a garage with a gunshot wound to the head.

Nearly 1,000 Polish museums and cultural institutions nationwide opened their doors to the public on the night of May19 as part of The European Night of Museums annual event.

The Polish economy is expected to grow by 2.7% year on year in 2012 and slow down to 2.6% in 2013, according to the spring forecast of the European Commission.

Polish Filmfest, presented in partnership with the Film Society of Minneapolis/St. Paul, presents seven days of award winning films by Polish filmmakers.



Euro 2012: Creating History Together

Ithough the union can't match the Jagellonian Dynasty's power and influence, Poland and Ukraine's joint sponsorship of Euro 2012 had all of Europe enthralled this summer. The 2012 UEFA European Football Championship, or Euro 2012, was the 14th European Championship for national football (soccer) teams. The final tournament, hosted by Poland and Ukraine, drew fans to stadiums in both countries and had others glued to TV sets throughout the world.

A good barometer of a nation's economic health is its indulgence in recreation. Visual arts, music, dance and sports

entertain and offer diversion. It takes money and a good infrastructure to construct and operate facilities to house these recreations. It also requires patrons with sufficient disposable income. Poland has it all. Warsaw's new National Stadium, which housed the opening match, gave Poland a chance to flex her economic muscle and emerge on the world stage as one of the strongest members of the European Union. No longer are Poles seen as "orphans" of Europe, suffering from partitions, two world wars and 45 years of communist rule. Today they sit at the head of the table, raising their glasses and toasting their recent growth and strength.

Like frequent trips to the gym for body building, Poland and Ukraine worked for years planning for the Championship. They sweated over details that would show off their economic prowess yet reflect their similar traditions and culture. In December of 2009, at Mykhailivska Square in Kiev, they unveiled the official logo for Euro 2012. Taking its visual identity from an art form familiar to rural areas of both countries, the logo resembled Wycinanki or Vytynanky, a traditional form of paper cutting. The selection of the logo underscored the organizers' desire to reflect the largely rural and agrarian elements of Poland and Ukraine.







It is estimated that Poland spent more than the equivalent of 18 billion euros and Ukraine nearly 3.3 billion preparing for the games. The UEFA required both host nations to renovate motorways, train stations and airport terminals surrounding the host cities of Warsaw, Gdańsk, Wrocław, Poznań, Lviv, Kharkiv, Donetsk and Kiev. The Championship games were the first major football event to be held in Eastern Europe in the modern era, and both countries worked hard to make the games inviting for *everyone*.

Early concerns that fans would turn national pride into ugly "soccer hooliganism" worried organizers. They enlisted the help of FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe), the inter-European network which includes fans, players, migrant and ethnic minority organizations, and governing bodies such as UEFA. As a result, there were 30 international monitors at the games, a hotline for fans to report racist and discriminatory incidents, and up to 300 public areas self-declared as Inclusive Zones to provide welcoming spaces across Poland and Ukraine.

But Europe takes football seriously, and some of the match ups involving the Championship's host countries struck at the historical and emotional hearts of fans. In particular, the game between Poland and the heavily-favored Russia that ended in a 1-1 draw had Polish fans on their feet. Who wouldn't want to demonstrate strength and agility to a former occupier? Perhaps Jakub

Blaszczykowski's amazing goal in the 57th minute will raise him to the ranks of Polish heroes like Jan III Sobieski.

When the last fan has gone home and the stadium lights have been turned off, what remains of Euro 2012 are memories. Memories of ear-deafening crowd roars; flags painted on walls, cheeks, fingernails, and bare chests; salty tears from losses and victories; new best friends from foreign lands; and stories which will be repeated until the next Championship games in four more years. Just as the two countries were once united as one, together Poland and Ukraine fulfilled their ambitions and gained distinction in the history of this prized European Championship.



Grzegorz Lato (1950-)

Born in Malbork, the famous football striker and leading scorer at the 1974 World Cup epitomized Poland's decade long golden era of football. He is the only Polish player to win the Golden Boot at a World

Cup. He spent most of his career with Stal Mielec, leading them to various championships. After a long and glittering career in football, Lato turned to politics and served as a senator in Poland from 2001–2005. In 2008 he was elected President of the Polish Football Association, overseeing the country's governing body of football.
