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# Polish Saturday School 20th Anniversary

Grandma insisted we eat vegetables so we could be strong. Our parents insisted we study hard so we could do well in school. While they were both right, many of them missed a key to our growth, development and success that was right under their noses—speaking Polish.

With the rush of Central-European immigrants to America in the early 20th century, new citizens were eager to assimilate. Many shortened their names, sent their children to English-speaking schools, and made English the language at home. They viewed their native tongue as a hindrance to their children's success in the new world. They were wrong.

For decades, studies have shown that children with a second language statistically score higher on standardized tests such as the SAT, ACT, MCAT and LSAT—all needed for admission to colleges and universities. A second language is also linked to higher mathematical scores, increased creativity and problem solving skills. In Northeast Minneapolis a committed group of immigrant parents teach children and young adults the Polish language and foster in them an understanding of the history, traditions and culture of Poland.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Adam Mieckiewicz Polish Saturday School in Minneapolis. In late April they celebrated, with students performing poetry and songs in Polish, and dances by the young *Słoneczeki* dancers and the teenaged *Chabry* dance troupe,





many of whom studied at PSS. The celebratory event also included visiting dignitaries from Chicago, PSS alumni and former teachers.

The organizers of PSS offer classes for children as young as three years old, and bid farewell to them after high school graduation. In addition to language classes, students write and perform poetry and plays in Polish. PSS also participates in the international Math Kangaroo program, which encourages students to master math knowledge and skills. It is no coincidence that language and math skills occupy similar locations in the human brain.

# Poland's Wild Bison to be Slaughtered

A herd of 25 wild European bison living near the village of Stuposiany, Poland, are infected with tuberculosis. The disease



likely spread to bison sharing pastures with infected cattle in the Bieszczady Mountains. In April, a panel of 18 veterinary and breeding experts in Krosno asked permission to kill the rare wild animals. Mirosław Welz, a member of the veterinary panel, said, "Although it is a painful decision, it is the only way to protect remaining herds." The panel also suggested anti-TB vaccinations for all existing bison.

TB first appeared in the region's bison in 1997, which led veterinarians to kill a herd of 18 near Solina, just north of Stuposiany. The latest case was registered in early 2010 and two more from that herd died this year. The infected herd has been culled, but no reports have yet emerged about the elimination of the 25 bison.

Today's Polish bison are descendants of the Białowieża bison that were hunted

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#### **News From Poland**

A bill raising the retirement age to 67 was passed by the lower house of parliament. Poland's major labor union, Solidarity, staged several demonstrations in Warsaw protesting the bill. After the bill was passed, they blocked exits from the parliament and heckled parliament members who voted for the bill. The main opposition party, Law and Justice (PiS), announced that it will demand review of the bill by the Constitutional Tribunal.

After public outcry over the design of jerseys for the Polish national soccer team, President Bronisław Komorowski signed into law an amendment to the Bill on Emblems, Colors and the National Anthem under which the Polish eagle emblem will be obligatory on the national team's shirts.

Graduates of PSS continue to prove the scientists and their studies right, gaining admission to institutions of higher learning such as Harvard and Notre Dame to name a few. The recipient of this year's Angeline Guminga Scholarship, Julia Banasikowski (see article on this page), attends Notre Dame University and is proud of her 13 years in PSS. "Getting into and attending a school that is ranked among the top 20 universities in the nation is probably a culmination of what I learned academically as well as what I learned through my heritage and at PSS."

All of the PSS teachers are volunteers and many have committed 5-20 years serving at PSS. One of the older students' most inspirational teacher is Hanna Stankiewicz, or "Pani Hania" as she is fondly known. An engineer by profession, Pani Hania knows what students are capable of and motivates them to participate in presentations, projects and competitions. Julia greatly admires Pani Hania for the faith she has in her students' abilities, and her weaving of learning with fun. A project that tightened the bond between the two of them surrounded Julia's research of her grandmother's experience in concentrations camps and her grandfather's importance in Poland's Home Army.

Polish Saturday School runs from September to May. Classes are held from 9-noon at John Paul II school on University Avenue. Scheduled social events provide opportunities for parents to meet and mingle, often producing a strong professional and personal network of friends. to extinction, especially by German troops during World War I. Efforts to restore the species to the wild began in 1929 with the establishment of the Bison Restitution Center in Białowieża. By 1951, European bison were reintroduced into the wild in

Poland and Belarus. Because of their limited gene pool, European bison are highly vulnerable to illness and the sizes of herds continue to decline. Today an estimated 800 roam Central and Eastern Europe's forests.

# **Guminga Scholarship Awarded**

PACIM awarded Julia Banasikowski with the Angeline Guminga Scholarship for 2012. Julia is the daughter of Ewa



(Pietrykowska) and Richard Banasikowski of Savage, MN. She attends the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, where she is organizing the arrival and grand opening of the "Phenomenon of Solidarity" exhibit.

Among her accomplishments while in high school, Julia participated in the Model U.N. Assembly in Canada for two years, was a member of the National Honor Society, served as captain of her school's Swim and Dive Team and attended classes at the University of Minnesota during her senior year.

Julia also attended Polish Saturday
School for 13 years and feels those studies
shaped and educated her in a special way.
Through academic presentations about
monumental historical events, she participated in international competitions about
Polish history, such as the one sponsored
by Warsaw's Institute of National
Remembrance, which awarded her group
first place for a project last year. She
dances with the Dolina Polish Folk
Dancers and served as a lector at Holy
Cross Church's Polish Masses.

As a university student, Julia is an officer of the Polish Club of Notre Dame. She helps plan ethnic events around campus and works to strengthen ties with the local Polish community of South Bend. Her most recent extra-curricular work is organizing a traveling exhibit on the Solidarity Movement through the Institute of National Remembrance in Warsaw. In April the exhibit debuted at her university, where Julia represented the Polish students at Notre Dame. She spoke alongside the director of Notre Dame's Institute of European Studies, the Consulate General of Chicago and the Vice President of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America.

Julia plans to use the scholarship to fund her studies at Notre Dame, where she participates in the International Scholar Program, investigating governments in post-communist Eastern Europe.

Remember packing up the car for summer vacation? Remember the worried feeling that the hose didn't get turned off, the mail held, the dog kenneled or appointments canceled? Remember wondering if your house was still standing after a summer storm passed through while you were away?


Imagine escaping the bustle of daily life in the city by just walking a few blocks from home. With a key you unlock a gate that surrounds flowers, fruit trees, vegetable gardens and a summer home. Deep breaths revive you as you settle in for some much needed rest and relaxation. Welcome to Poland's *Ogródki Działkowe*. Located in the suburbs and deep in big cities, these allotment gardens provide Poles with a slice of paradise without the hassle or expense of travel.

Allotment gardens in Poland have been part of the urban landscape for more than a century. They are not community gardens in which an entire area is tended collectively. Rather they are parcels of land, usually from 300-500 square meters in size, which are rented and cared for by one individual or family. They came on the scene in earnest in the mid-19th century in Warsaw out of concern for the city's poor population. Local authorities, private landowners, charities and private companies provided the land for these allotment gardens. "City farming" allowed hungry citizens to grow their own produce and raise small farm animals. After feeding themselves and their families, many also sold their produce, creating added income.

In the 1930s and 40s, demand for allotment gardens grew in Poland's cities. At a time when many urban families' only source of food was from their Ogródki Działkowe, possession of these plots of land became competitive and a source of status. During the Communist era, Działki were allocated to professional groups such as teachers, railway workers or miners. Although war was over, a regular supply of food in stores remained uncertain. Again, these gardens provided food and income. And during a time when travel was severely limited by the Communist government, Poles escaped to their Działki for vacations, family reunions, hobby farming,

and maybe, on occasion, from a nagging wife or abusive husband.

Today, allotment gardens are used more for recreation than food provision. Green lawns and decorative flower beds are replacing solidly planted vegetable gardens and small livestock. The wooden houses and sheds that once dotted many Działki are now small brick homes with electricity, running water, sewer hook ups, and even basements. It may be as comfortable as home, but Polish authorities prohibit individuals from establishing a permanent home in their allotment garden. However, Polish ingenuity finds that money can be made by renting these homes short-term. Immigrants from Ukraine, Belarus and other neighboring countries, wanting to get a foot hold in Poland, find these garden homes perfect for their transition.

Ogródki Działkowe add to Poland's interest in the green movement and care for the environment. The concrete maze that constitutes Polish cities seems to leech oxygen from her people; but her one million allotment gardens serve as lungs for the urbanites, allowing everyone to breathe easier. However, the continual push to develop land and make money threatens these green havens. In 1990, the number of Ogródki Działkowe steeply declined as gardens were requisitioned back to their owners, demolished by developers and replaced with new houses. In 2005, a governmental act tightened regulations on the gardens and provided them with an infrastructure for proper function. Managed by the Polish Union of Allotment Gardens, Ogródki Działkowe "...are considered public utilities, designed to meet leisure, recreational and other social needs of the members of the local communities...facilitating horticultural cultivation for one's own use as well as to enhance ecological standards of the surroundings." As a result, by law they are provided environmental protection as a rural or forest area.

The next time you are in the middle of a Polish city and find some juicy berries for sale at a makeshift corner stand, or your nose guides you to fresh flowers for sale outside a church, it is a good guess that these are products of *Ogródki Działkowe*.




Cezary Trybański 1979-
