

## **News From Poland**

Poland's PM Donald Tusk received the prestigious Charlemagne Prize for his distinguished service on behalf of European unification. Angela Merkel, Vaclav Havel and Bill Clinton are among the prior recipients of the award.

The Polish and Belarusian Foreign Ministers discussed at a meeting in Warsaw the worsening situation of the Polish minority in Belarus.

Vladimir Putin will attend a ceremony in April to mark the massacre of thousands of Polish army officers in Katyn forest by Soviet secret police during World War II.

A Swedish man has been arrested in Stockholm over the theft of the **Arbeit** Macht Frei sign from Auschwitz death camp. The arrest came after a Polish court issued a European arrest warrant for him. Five Polish men have already been arrested over the theft.

Poland will halt work on the Register of Illegal Services and Internet Sites to make sure that the law does not limit the freedom of speech, Poland's PM Donald Tusk declared during a debate with internet users.

Very **cold weather** (-20°F in NE Poland) in January caused serious transportation problems, power outages and several deaths among homeless people.

# **Heritage Homecoming**

Poland welcomes back Suwalska geese, Green Leg hens, Polish Red cattle and other local breeds as farmers struggle to adapt to modern times and the challenges that come with membership in the European Union.

#### Open to Options

How important these old breeds will be for modern Polish agriculture isn't yet clear, but the farmers we met know for



sure that they need to do something different. They're too far from big cities to sell to large markets, and "buy local" is still associated with hard times not long gone, when local food was the only option. Instead, it's generally viewed as chic and modern to buy produce from Germany or Spain.

Less expensive milk from other regions of Europe keeps milk prices down, and the EU's strict rules are shutting down many of the old cooperatively run milk collection stations.

Going organic, a good option for small farmers in other parts of the world, isn't a viable solution here. An organic label doesn't bring higher prices outside of Warsaw and Krakow, rendering the cost and effort of certification unattractive to most, even though many farms cannot afford commercial fertilizers and pesticides and are therefore organic by default.

These realities leave many in the northeast and elsewhere in the country little choice but to operate on a subsistence basis—consuming most of what they grow, selling some informally and living off pensions.

Farm products derived from robust breeds that deliver premium prices, like Green Leg chicken eggs and artisan cheeses made from the milk of heritage breed cows, are solid options for increasing income.

Jasnewicz and I spent an afternoon making one such cheese at the farm of Tad and Alicja Jedlinski and spread wedges of it with homemade blueberry jam. Though I couldn't quite pronounce its proper Polish name, it was absolutely delicious. The milk came from the family's gorgeous White Backed cow—one of just 50 in the region, where it was originally developed—that reliably gives two gallons a day on minimal forage.

This farm also featured a young Polish Red and a flock of moody Suwalska geese ranging out back imperiously, near fields where the Jedlinskis grow prodigious amounts of beets, potatoes and carrots. The whole scene is part of the family's agritourism business, a popular form of bed and breakfast with an agricultural twist that attracts people from the city to experience farm life. In addition to providing superior eggs, meat and cheese, the Heifer-supplied heritage breeds fit perfectly into the educational mission of agritourism.


The robust and healthy nature of these old/new breeds continues to draw farmers to Heifer's program. As Andrzej Mikielska told us, "It just makes sense to raise a healthier cow, even if you get less milk. That cow's milk will be of higher quality and contain more good enzymes." And in that spirit, encouraged by the local Heifer program, he and his wife now dream of an apple orchard, populated entirely by a local sort of apple that's become very uncommon in the region. They believe these apples might make a very fine wine. What could taste sweeter than that?

So it is that Poland's small farms and historic breeds have struck a new and dynamic partnership, one that preserves both biodiversity and agricultural traditions. The projects have become so popular now that requests for Polish Red cows, in just one example, are piling up quickly. And that's a great problem to have.

# The Vistula River

#### The Heart and Soul of Poland


The Vistula River, Wisła in Polish, springs forth from the Polish Carpathian Mountains, winds its way through the heart of Poland and ends in the Baltic Sea. Not just a geographic feature, it also winds its way through the psyche of Poland, through her history, her soul and her lifeblood.

Known even to the Romans, the Vistula rises from the western slopes of Barania Góra in the Polish Beskid Mountains, south of Bielsko-Biała, from two streams: the Little White Vistula, Biała Wisełka, and the Little Black Vistula, Czarna Wisełka. From there it flows 651 miles, traversing the entire country and passing through many of Poland's most important and historical cities including Kraków, Sandomierz, Warsaw, Toruń and Gdańsk. It drains over half of Poland and is the fourth longest river in Europe outside of Russia; only the Danube, Rhein and Elbe rivers are longer.

Through the centuries the Vistula was the main artery for trade and much of the grain produced by Poland found its way to the rest of Europe by way of the port of Gdańsk, where tradesmen grew rich on the goods shipped on the Vistula. This wealth and power of Gdańsk made possible its many privileges and autonomy from the Polish crown.

The Battle for Warsaw in 1920, in which the Poles defeated the Russians in what came to be called the "Miracle at the Vistula," took place at Modlin where the Narew and Bug Rivers empty into the Vistula. This battle safeguarded Poland's newfound independence after 123 years of occupation.

Near the city of Tczew, about 30 miles before it drains into the Baltic Sea, the Vistula splits into two branches. The Nogat, to the right, empties to the sea near Elblag and the Leniwka, on the left, empties through Gdańsk. Much of this delta area is below sea level, much like the Netherlands. Over the centuries Poles and Mennonites from Holland have built up a complex system of dikes, levees and canals to keep the sea out, thereby creating fertile fields in what would otherwise be sea and marsh.

The onset of global warming and the subsequent rise in sea levels threatens this delta region and the governments of both Poland and the European Union are conducting studies on the impact of this possible flooding and ways to prevent it or at least lessen its effects.

# **Echos from the North**

News from Little Falls. Minnesota

As I write this the snow is gently falling. Many of you readers have had enough snow this winter. It brings back memories of blizzards in the late 30s and 40s.

I grew up on a farm midway between Elm Dale and Sobieski about 12 miles from Little Falls. The comforts of life electricity, telephone and indoor plumbing — were not available in rural Minnesota. I have always loved a blizzard; but then, I have never had to shovel or plow out after a blizzard so I just remember the good things. I had a half mile to walk to school so if the weather was bad my dad always took all the neighboring kids to or from school in a big horse drawn sled. We were always cozy and warm under heavy blankets.

"No School Today" was as welcome back then as it is today, and sometimes a snow storm would last 3 or 4 days and snowplows were not as plentiful and speedy as today; but on those snow days we were never bored. No electronic games or TV were available, but we did have a battery powered radio. Days went by quickly as my siblings and I would play numerous card and board games. Oh, do you remember the paper dolls? The Sears Roebuck Catalog supplied us with a great variety of dolls and clothes. All we needed was a pair of scissors and an imagination. The furniture section supplied us with rooms filled with furniture. Not as fancy as the cardboard dolls which followed.

The house was always filled with wonderful aromas of baking bread and goodies and wonderful soups and other dishes, all home made by Mom. Food was cooked on a wood burning stove and our refrigerator was an enclosed, unheated back porch. Can you imagine a meal cooked on a wood stove and always on time? That was an art in itself.

Koziołek Matołek **Billy Goat** 

Matołek came into being in 1933 as a children's fictional character in one of the first and most famous Polish comic books by Kornel Makuszyński (story) and Marian Walentynowicz (art).

He has become a cult classic and a major part of Polish children's literature. Besides the comic books, there is a TV series and DVDs of his adventures. Matołek has influenced generations of Poles to the present. His quest is to find the town of Pacanów where they shoe goats and not horses. The books have even contributed to the Polish language: pacan and matol (slowpoke, dummy) and w Pacanowie kozy kują (In Pacanów, they shoe goats.)



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# Pancanów, Poland



The town dates back to the thirteenth century and in the fourteenth century it was larger than Kielce. However it faced a decline due to a cholera epidemic in 1700 and ultimately remained a village.
