Americans Perform at Warsaw's Jewish Festival

U.S. performers and diplomats kicked off the IX Singer's Festival of Jewish Culture in Warsaw late this summer. At an opening ceremony at *Synagoga im. Nozykow*, U.S. Ambassador to Poland Lee A. Feinstein described the Festival as "A celebration of Jewish heritage, multiculturalism and diversity, which Poland and the United States share."

Underscoring the Ambassador's remarks were Festival performances by two U.S. talents. African-American Joshua Nelson, aka the "Prince of Kosher Gospel," and Grammy Award winning Frank London and his band, the Klezmatics. Performing at an openair stage at Grzybowski Square, the performers awed crowds with their musicality and sensitivity. While both sets of performers are uniquely American, their understanding of Yiddish culture, music and traditions made them right at home at the Festival.



Nelson is both a musician and Hebrew teacher. While studying at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem he started blending Hebrew texts with gospel melodies and arranging Jewish hymns in gospel style. He has performed with jazz greats, around the world for Presidents, congregations and at major music festivals. Oprah Winfrey dubbed him "The Next Big Thing."

London, a New York based trumpeter and bandleader, is regarded as one of the greatest performers to emerge on the Jewish music scene since the genre's

Distinguished Silver Medals Awarded

In July, four PACIM members received high honors for their years of work with the UNESCO English Language Camp in



Toruń, Poland. Charlene Kaletka Delaney, Jim Neuenfeldt, Patricia Beben and Joe Beben each received the prestigious *Unitas Durat Palatinatus Cuiaviano-Pomeraniensis* medal from Piotr Całecki, Marshal of the Kujawy-Pomorze province in Poland.

"These awards are a symbol of recognition of long-term cooperation and contributions to the development of contacts between Poland and the United States, and gratitude for the organization of educational activities for young people in Kujawy and Pomorze," Całecki announced.

The award recipients have a combined service of 35 years in the program. Charlene Kaletka Delaney, the American Team Director, fell in love with Toruń when she first arrived in 1993. "This was my nineteenth visit here and I can say that Toruń is my second home." Back in the States, Delaney serves on PACIM's Board of Directors; Jim Neuenfeldt is President of the Pommern Regional Group of Minnesota; Joe Beben is a contributing writer to *PolAm*; and his wife, Pat Beben, serves on *PolAm's* editorial staff.

Andrzej Drozdowski, the Polish Camp Director, reflected on his American colleagues' honor: "I am proud of what is happening in our school these nineteen years. I watch how the young people participate in our camps. I see how much work Americans put into coming here." The UNESCO Language Camp enables young Poles to work on English language skills and learn firsthand the similarities and differences in the two cultures. The Camp also provides an opportunity for an exchange of experiences between teachers from the U.S. and Poland."

Their Blood Has Been Spilled As Water... and Alas Not Buried

The pain and suffering of Holocaust victims seems the most tragic aspect of Nazi oppression. We grieve for the loss of innocent lives and for the great wrongs man did against his fellow man. A closer look into that horrific historical event wrenches the heart further when we understand that Jews were more than murdered. They were violated closest to their beliefs and devotions.

To be a Jew is to follow laws. Handed down by God to govern and guide His chosen people, Jewish laws are woven into their worship, daily lives and worldview. The Talmud, the body of Jewish civil and ceremonial laws, states that taking a single life is like destroying the entire world since all people descended from a single person; and hastening death under any circumstances is forbidden.

But Judaism understands that death is a natural process, and care for the dead body that once housed the Spirit of God is paramount. Mourning practices show respect for the dead and comfort the living. Most communities have a holy society (*chevra kaddisha*) to care for the dead—a service for someone who can never repay them.

Once rituals for the dead body are completed, burial close to the location and time of death is required. Jewish laws prohibit cremation out of a belief that the body is an element in a complex and ultimately spiritual being. Anything other than a proper burial for a Jew is an act of desecration or sacrilege.

Jewish cemeteries (*beit olam*) are called "house of the eternal." They are an important way to trace genealogy, a key element in Jewish tradition. Maintaining cemeteries fulfills the commandment to provide dignity to the deceased and ensures their memory will never be obliterated.

When the Nazis invaded Poland in 1939, Jewish cemeteries were destroyed. More than just an act of pillaging, the desecration of graves was intentional malice. Gravestones, walls and gates were used by the Nazis to build roads, pavements and fortifications. As an added blow, the labor for this work was forced upon Jews.

In May 2001, a Polish movement to restore Jewish cemeteries began with the Ozarow cemetery — more than 400 years old and nearly destroyed in World War II. Money raised for the project allowed for much restoration and the inspiration of a 2003 documentary film, "Return to Ozarow — Mending a Broken Link." The project also gave life to the Poland Jewish Cemeteries Restoration Project, Inc. (PJCRP).

With an estimated 1,400 devastated Jewish cemeteries in Poland, PJCRP's work is not easy. Their efforts include fencing around the large number of mass graves, recognizing similar efforts underway in Poland and raising money for perpetual care of every site. They photograph and document entire restoration projects, and educate youth about Jewish heritage in Poland.

For the millions of Jews whose bodies were incinerated during the war, other memorial efforts have long been underway. From Bełżec to Auschwitz, names of victims and ashes of their bodies have been preserved to create graves. Treated with reverence, these sites allow for prayerful meditation and the fulfillment of Jewish law.

Perhaps the best example of a concentration camp memorial is found outside of Lublin, Poland, at Majdanek. It is a well preserved camp since it was captured almost intact by Soviet forces. In 1947, locals began collecting ashes of the victims and placing them in a mound near execution ditches and the crematorium. In 1969, 25 years after Majdanek's liberation, Wiktor Tolin designed a mausoleum that now holds those collected ashes. Round, stark and open, the concrete mausoleum allows hundreds of daily visitors to pay respect and pray for the victims, whose ashes are mixed with the camp's soil they were forced to labor upon.

The Nazi occupation of Poland and the Holocaust tried hard to erase Jews and their memory from world history. The restoration and preservation of Poland's sacred Jewish story honors them and keeps their memory alive. That work remains among the greatest of good deeds (*mitzvot*).





This August, more than 90,000 Daf Yomi students celebrated the end of the 12th cycle in New Jersey's MetLife Stadium.
