ACPC spearheaded a national fundraising campaign to restore the General Casimir Pulaski monument in Savannah, GA. With the ACPC initiative, the human remains found under the monument were officially accepted as Pulaski's remains. ACPC representatives served on the Savannah committee that arranged for the public Reinterment ceremonies which took place in October 2005.



About ACPC

In this article you will find information about several ACPC projects: restoration of General Casimir Pulaski monument in Savannah, research and dissemination of information about first Polish tradesmen in Jamestown in 1608, "Polish Perspectives" booth at the National Council for Social Studies, and scholarships offered to Polish American students.

Poles in Jamestown in 1608

John Smith was a British soldier who was a founder of the American colony of Jamestown in the early 1600s. He was born in England and decided on a life of combat and served with the English Army abroad. He was captured and enslaved by the Turks but escaped traveling through Poland. In the book he later wrote, titled "The True Travels", he describes how he crossed Poland, aided by people, he described as having,

Respect, Mirth, Content and Entertainment.

In addition to the hospitality John Smith observed their personal industriousness and skill at various trades which would be useful in a pioneering environment. When Smith was made part of a multi-person council that would govern the new colony, he invited the Polish craftsmen to establish profitable industries. On October 1, 1608 the second supply ship from London the "Mary & Margaret" arrived in Jamestown. On the ship were the first non-English craftsmen and industry specialists.



This medal was found in Jamestown archaeological digs recently and was on display in the exhibit hall. St. Hyacinth is a Polish saint canonized in 1594, highly revered with many churches in Poland and abroad bearing his name. It is assumed that the medal was brought to Jamestown by Polish tradesmen in 1608.

Jamestown colony (continued)

These artisans soon began making soap-ash, glass and lumber milling such as wainscot, clapboard and pine planks. They also produced the pitch, turpentine and tar that were essential for naval enterprises, and they explored for mining locations.



The original colony investors were expecting to mine gold to make the Colony profitable, but as A.C. Chandler, who served as president of the College of William & Mary from 1919 to 1934 remarked.

the colony's only profitable industries were those operated by Polish settlers.


Sir George Yeardley, the Virginia Colony's governor, returned from England in 1619 with instructions to form the first elected legislative body in Colonial America. Yeardley led the first representative Virginia General Assembly, the House of Burgesses, to meet on American soil on July 30, 1619. This assembly would give "free liberty" to all men through "freely elected" representatives charged with making laws for the land." Suffrage, however, was only extended to Englishmen.

Fun Facts

- ACPC is celebrating its 75th Anniversary this year. Founded in 1948, the Council currently represents the interests of 34 affiliated and supporting organizations in 15 states and the District of Columbia. The 2023 celebration will take place in Detroit, Michigan, where ACPC was created. Attendees will visit the Orchard Lake Schools, the monument erected to honor the Polish soldiers of General Józef Haller's Army and the National Polish American Sports Hall of Fame Museum.
- PACIM has been a long-time affiliate of ACPC. Other Minnesota affiliates included Polanie Club and the Polish Cultural Institute and Museum in Winona. The affiliated organizations of the Council create a natural, nationwide network of organizations committed to furthering the cause of Polish language, art, history, and cultural involvement and awareness.

When the Polish craftsmen learned they would not have the right to vote, they caused a civil rights action in the form of a work stoppage demanding suffrage.

The Virginia Company court records dated 21 July 1619 stated: "Upon some dispute of the Polonians resident in Virginia, it was now agreed (notwithstanding any former order to the contrary) that they shall be enfranchized, and made as free as any inhabitant there whatsoever". And because their skill in making pitch & tarr and soap-ashes shall not dye with them, it is agreed that some young men, shall be put unto them to learne their skill & knowledge therein for the benefitt of the Country hereafter." This record also established America's first Apprentice Program.

National Council for Social Studies -"Polish Perspectives"

Over the years, ACPC has won popular support from Polish and Polish-American organizations for its participation in the annual National Council for the Social Studies conference. More than a thousand educators from throughout the U.S. attend this annual event. The "Polish Perspectives" colorful, inviting, and informative exhibit booths have proved to be very popular.

Irena Szewiola and Wally West strategically envisioned the Polish Perspectives exhibit in 2001. In 2003 it was The Chicago Art Club, an affiliate of ACPC who took charge of Presenting Polish Perspectives at the Conference in Chicago with the late Dr. Vivian Walkosz in charge. In 2004 Barbara Lemecha and Henrietta Nowakowski took over the project and continued for 6 years. The Polish Perspectives Exhibit will see its twenty-third year in Nashville, TN in 2023.



- Every year ACPC organizes its Annual Convention in a different state. In 1966 Polanie Club sponsored the Annual Convention at the University of Minnesota.It celebrated the Polish Millennium with a program of distinguished lecturers on the theme, "Poland through a Thousand Years". PACIM also organized ACPC conventions in 1996 and the most recent one in August of 2018.

News from Poland

War in Ukraine

On April 5, President Volodymyr Zelensky of Ukraine visited Warsaw on an official visit. During his visit, Zelensky was decorated with Poland's oldest and most prestigious order, the Order of the White Eagle, by Polish President Andrzej Duda at the presidential palace in Warsaw. The discussions between Zelensky and Duda focused on various topics, including the post-war reconstruction of Ukraine, increased weapon supplies to Kyiv, Ukraine's closer integration with the EU, and the issue of soaring costs of farm product imports.

The duty-free imports of Ukrainian grains to the EU, intended for countries affected by blocked Ukrainian ports, caused a grain market crisis in Poland when the grains remained there instead of being transported to other countries. Protests by Polish farmers led to the resignation of the Minister of Agriculture and compelled the government to compensate farmers for their losses, implement stricter customs controls, and explore alternative uses for the surplus grains. Additionally, Polish farmers will receive subsidies from the EU.

After President Joe Biden's decision to allow allies to train Ukrainian forces in operating F-16 fighter jets and potentially provide the aircraft themselves, Poland expressed its willingness to participate in the pilot training program. Norway, Belgium, and Portugal also joined as participants.

The governments of Russia and Belarus signed an agreement to deploy tactical nuclear weapons in Belarus.

In the second installment of reimbursement by the EU's European Peace Facility, Poland received €246 million (\$264 million) for the arms transferred to Ukraine. Further payments are expected.

During a leisurely ride through a forest near the city of Bydgoszcz, a horse rider discovered the wreckage of an unarmed Russian cruise missile. Military sources reported that the cruise missile had been fired during an air raid on Ukraine in December 2022, carried out by Russian aircraft based in Belarus, which prompted NATO aircraft to scramble. Following the incident, the military conducted an unsuccessful search for the missile but failed to notify civil authorities and the public. Bydgoszcz, located about 250 miles west of the border with Belarus, is an important military training center for NATO

Economy

INFLATION

The year-to-year inflation rate dropped to 18.4% in February, then further decreased to 16.1% in March and 14.7% in April. However, when excluding food and energy, the inflation rate remained steady at 12.3% during these three months. Food prices saw a significant increase of 24% in March and 19.7% in April compared to the previous year. The Polish National Bank (NBP) predicts that the average inflation rate in 2023 will range from 10.2% to 13.5%. According to the NBP, the target rate of 2.5% +/- 1% is not expected to be achieved until 2025.

Despite some economists advocating for an increase in the base interest rate to combat inflation, the Council of Monetary Policy (RPP) of the NBP has resisted such calls. The current base interest rate is 6.75%, and it has not changed since September 2022.

In 2022, the national deficit reached 3.4% of GDP, while the national debt rose to 49.1% of GDP. Economists expect a higher deficit and further growth of the national debt this year.

UNEMPLOYMENT

The unemployment rate in March was 2.8%, according to Eurostat. In comparison, the unemployment rate in the European Union was 6%, and in the Eurozone, it was 6.5%. Among EU countries, only Czechia had a lower unemployment rate than Poland, standing at 2.6%.

ELECTRICITY

As part of the "solidarity shield" initiative, approximately 8 million households in Poland will only pay 40% of the market price for electricity this year.

NUCLEAR POWER PLANT

An initial contract was signed with American companies Westinghouse and Bechtel for the construction of a nuclear power plant in Poland. The construction is scheduled to commence in 2026.

The European Commission sent a bill to the Polish government, demanding a fine of €174 million (\$186.7 million) for non-compliance with judgments of the Court of Justice of the European Union.

Anniversaries

The 80th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising was commemorated, honoring the Jews who fought against Nazi occupiers in 1943. The event was attended by President Izchak Herzog of Israel and President Frank-Walter Steinmeier of Germany. During the ceremony, 96-year-old Polish Holocaust survivor Marian Turski condemned those who spread hate and emphasized the importance of combating rising hatred and violence in the world today.

On the 80th anniversary of the massacre carried out by Ukrainian nationalists, Ruslan Stefanczuk, the speaker of the upper chamber of the Ukrainian parliament, paid tribute to the victims during his speech in the Polish parliament. He announced joint efforts to commemorate the victims and conduct historical research of the events, emphasizing the importance of accepting the truth, even if it may be painful.

Labor

Labor laws underwent some changes, including provisions for unpaid time off to care for family or household members, time off for urgent family matters due to force majeure, and an extension of paternity leave by 9 weeks. The legislation also addressed remote work, requiring employees to notify their employer about where they will be working remotely. Remote workers may be subject to work safety and sobriety inspections but are entitled to electricity and water use compensation. The bill also defines occasional remote work at the employee's request, limited to 24 days per year.

The Ministry of Health plans to utilize Al algorithms to support medical diagnosing, aiming to enhance the healthcare system with technological advancements.

Polish trumpet player won third place in the **International Junior Trumpet** Competition.

PACIM had a pleasure to host Amelia Kowalewska, a 17-year-old trumpet player from Płock, Poland. A talented International Trumpet Guild scholarship recipient won third place in the International Junior Competition in Minneapolis on June 3, 2023.

Later that day Amelia performed together with Sławomir Cichor, a professor from the Music Academy in Łódż. The program titled "Slavic Soul" included Cichor's own compositions and arrangements of Polish works, as well as compositions by other contemporary composers.



On Sunday, June 4th, Amelia performed a short concert at the Holy Cross Church in Minneapolis. She played together with her music teacher, Grzegorz Dębski, and organ player Chris Brandt. The program included Baroque compositions by Henry Purcel, Jeremiah Clarke and Francesco Manfredini, "Ave Maria" by Michał Lorenc and "Spanish Impression" by Sławomir Cichor.

Amelia Kowalewska will graduate from the Music High School in Płock in 2024. Her dream is to further develop her musical skills at a prestigious college or university in the United States or Europe.

Amelia's accomplishments include:

- 2021 participation in the YOUNG Concertgebouworkest project in the Netherlands
- 2020 2022 Ministry of Culture and National Heritage **Scholarships**
- 2023 prestigious Młoda Polska (Young Poland) Scholarship
- 2023 becoming a member of Sinfonia Varsovia
- 2023 3rd place in the International **Trumpet Guild Junior** Competition in Minneapolis



PACIM Farewell to Winter

At the end of the afternoon, all these Marzannas were paraded down to the father of waters and summarily thrown into the water to the delight of everyone present. Even if all this work did not necessarily bring a quicker end to winter, a wonderful time was had by all. Thank you PACIM.




Irene Colston 1935-2023
